How can I be truly thankful for Thanksgiving dinner? My Thanksgiving table will be full, but I feel guilty feasting when so many—adults and children—will not have enough food this day or any day. How can I enjoy the scrumptious deserts when I know that throughout the world many will die this day of malnutrition? How can I be truly thankful, Lord, for having my family around me, especially my grandchildren when there are orphans of war, refugee children, or young people being snatched, given, and sold into sexual slavery (sometimes by their own family)?

How can I find peace in a Thanksgiving worship service after the shooting at Tree of Life synagogue? What peace can there be when places like schools, places of worship, etc., that we assumed would always be safe, become arenas tor those demented by evil and hate to kill innocent and vulnerable people? In Pittsburgh, we have grown numb to the almost nightly shootings in our various neighborhoods. But executing sweet, devout, harmless worshippers that you don't even know, simply because of who they are and what they believe, is enough to destroy any peace we may be caring in our hearts.

I don't blame God. I don't even question why God allowed this to happen. God created us to have a free will

and we caused that free will to warp and become broken by turning it away from our God and toward our self. When evil has the same claim to freedom as the good, evil things will and do happen. I'm not even surprised by such things. I know that evil is real. It is not simply an adjective, it is a noun. I have faced and fought evil all my life, both for control in the world around me, and in my own heart. Evil will be a daily reality until Jesus comes to take me to that place He has prepared for me. But how can I give thanks when my heart is broken into many little pieces?

Before Thanksgiving this year there are a few things I need to do.

- I need to turn to God's word for a solid foundation in an unstable world. In that word alone is truth to which we can hold fast. We need to hold on to the conviction that in spite of anything that happens, God will redeem and restore. I read Psalm 16:9-11: Therefore my heart is glad, and my soul rejoices; my body also dwells secure. For thou dost not give me up to Sheol, or let thy godly one see the pit. Thou dost show me the path of life; in thy presence there is fullness of joy, in thy right hand are pleasurers for evermore.
- I need to keep hate out of my heart. Our culture is focused on winning. But the monster who walked into Tree of Life synagogue on Saturday morning didn't win. He lost! And our hating that monster with a greater hate than he has won't make us win either. If justice is meted out, he will receive what he deserves. But hatred isn't justice. Your hatred allows the person who shot our gentile neighbors to reach out and harm you too. Your hate won't hurt him. But as your hate gets stronger and heavier the weight is yours to carry, not his.
- We cannot fix the brokenness, violence and hatred in our world with easy answers. Gun control will not keep evil from happening. Neither will arming everybody, or hardening soft targets. Violence is like poison Ivy. You can cut it off but it just grows back. It will continue to

grow back until you kill the root. The root grows not just in our culture, our government or our political ideology. The rood grows in the human heart. I can do nothing to rid another's heart of evil except to exhort or persuade. But I can do something about my heart. I can refuse to give in to hate. I can refuse to dislike someone I don't even know. I can focus on doing good over getting even. I can't make you do that, but I can make myself do it.

Finally, don't fool yourself into thinking your anger is righteous anger. Don't think that just because you stand on what you see as the "correct" side of any issue that you have any right to act against anyone. The recent Supreme Court nomination is a perfect example. Both the nominee and his accuser seemed perfectly sincere in what they testified. But those testimonies were complete opposites. It is possible that neither was telling what really happened. It is possible that both sincerely believed that he or she was telling what really happened. It is possible that one knew he or she was telling what really happened while the other was being deliberately deceptive. All of that is possible. What is impossible is that both were telling what really happened. Both stories cannot be actual fact. So it all boiled down to which one you believed. Did we, as a nation, sit down with others who disagreed with us and talk about why? Many rose up in righteous anger thinking that they knew the unknowable and that gave them the right to say or do almost anything they wanted to those who disagreed with them. Civil discourse flows from a loving and respectful heart; not from self-righteousness.

This thanksgiving I am not going to give thanks because my world is perfect. I am not going to give thanks because my heart and mind are perfect. I am certainly not going to give thanks because I have been more fortunate or better off than so many others. I am going to give thanks that I am loved, called and held by a savior who calls my failures sin, paid sin's price for me, and forgives and draws me to Himself. In this

broken world it is all I have to give thanks for but it is more than enough! Have a happy and sincerely meaningful thanksgiving.
